

Information about authors

Michael Bittman (FASSA) is an Adjunct Professorial Fellow in the Discipline of Sociology at the University of New England and a Research Associate at the Centre for Time Use Research, University of Oxford. In recent years, his research has focused on the organisation of care within families.

Dina Bowman is a senior manager in the research and policy centre at the Brotherhood of St Laurence. She is an honorary fellow in the School of Social and Political Sciences at the University of Melbourne. Her research focuses on the processes and experience of inequality, particularly in relation to work, gender, age, disability and care issues.

Bruce Bradbury is a Senior Research Fellow at the Social Policy Research Centre (University of New South Wales). His research interests include the measurement of living standards, child poverty, income support, labour market policies, consumer equivalence scales, and geographic dimensions of social policies. He is a member of the academic advisory committees for both of Australia's large-scale, longitudinal surveys, the Household Income and Labour Dynamics Australia (HILDA) and the Longitudinal Survey of Australian Children (LSAC).

Judith E. Brown is an Adjunct Research Fellow at the University of New England. She has used her expertise in time-use analysis to explore the links between parents' socio-economic background, job quality, children's physical activity patterns and children's obesity as well as their socio-emotional wellbeing.

Myra Hamilton is a Research Fellow in the Social Policy Research Centre at the University of New South Wales. Her main research interests and subjects of publication are retirement incomes policy, welfare reform, the service needs and experiences of people with caring responsibilities, and the management of social risks over the life course.

Duncan Ironmonger (FASSA) is Director of the Households Research Unit, Department of Economics, the University of Melbourne, where he is Honorary Principal Fellow and Associate Professor. His recent major research has been in household economics, specialising in household input-output tables and household satellite national accounts, estimates of Gross Household Product (GHP) and modeling the household economy.

Yvette Maker is a PhD candidate in the School of Social and Political Sciences at the University of Melbourne. Her research concerns the treatment of unpaid care in Australian income support policy and its gendered implications, focusing on the similarities and inconsistencies in the framing of recent reforms to income support for sole parents and unpaid carers.

Jan Nicholson is Research Director at the Parenting Research Centre, Honorary Principal Research Fellow at the Murdoch Childrens Research Institute, and Adjunct Professor in the Centre for Learning Innovation at Queensland University of Technology. Jan's research examines the influence of contemporary family, social and organisational environments on children's healthy development, with a particular focus on vulnerable families. She is a specialist in parenting and family functioning and is co-investigator on studies promoting effective parenting, early literacy and healthy early life nutrition.

Peter Saunders holds a Research Chair in the Social Policy Research Centre at the University of New South Wales and was the Centre's Director between 1987 and 2007. He is currently the President of the Australian Social Policy Association (ASPA).

Lyndall Strazdins is an Associate Professor at the National Centre for Epidemiology & Population Health at the Australian National University. Her research addresses time pressures and family life, examining the effects of current workforce participation policies, change workplace organization and their impact on both parents' and children's well-being.

Melissa Wong is a Research Fellow at the Social Policy Research Centre, University of New South Wales. Her research interests include the measurements of poverty, deprivation and social exclusion as well as development economics.
